THE ACADEMIC COSTUME

The black caps and gowns worn by the students and faculty in the academic procession are of ancient origin. They have been the traditional costume of the scholar since medieval times and probably represent an adaptation of the ecclesiastical dress since many of the scholars of the period were members of the monastic orders.

An intercollegiate commission, in 1893, drafted a uniform code for costumes which has since been adopted by

the majority of colleges and universities in the United States. Each of the three academic degrees—bachelor, master, and doctor—has its own distinctive gown and hood. The bachelor's gown is distinguished by its long point sleeve. The master's gown has a long, narrow, closed sleeve, extending below the knee; the arm is passed through a slit at the elbow. In contrast, the doctor's gown has a full, bell-shaped sleeve with three bars of velvet. The opening of this gown is faced with wide velvet bands. The velvet trim may be black or of a color indicating the general field of learning of the wearer, for example, blue for philosophy, green for medicine, or purple for law.

The most colorful and distinctive item of the academic costume is the hood which passes around the neck and extends down the back. The doctor's is the largest of the hoods and the bachelor's the smallest. The bachelor's hood is often omitted. The color of the velvet edging indicates the field of learning. Reference: American University and Colleges American Council on Education, 1968.

Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty:

About Social Security's "Guaranteed" Annual Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA)

Dear Rusty: I've been reading a lot lately about speculation on what next year's benefit increase will be, and it seems like most of the experts are suggesting a range of 2.5% to 3%. My neighbor says don't worry about it, because there will always be some level of increase come January. It's guaranteed, right? **Signed: Retired But Questioning**

Dear Retired: You've brought up a common belief about the annual Social Security COLA, one that we hear often. Let's start with some background. Each year's COLA results from comparing the third quarter average Consumer Price Index (CPI-W) each year to the same average from the preceding year. The result of dividing the current year's average by the previous year's average produces the COLA for the following year. For 2024's adjustment, the 2023 third-quarter average was 301.2 and the comparable figure for 2022 was 291.9, producing the 3.2% benefit addition.

It's not always the case that the year-to-year CPI calculation produces a positive result, as was the case three times so far this century. As recently as 2016, for example, the 2015 third-quarter average was 233.3 and the comparable figure for 2014 was 234.2, producing a negative change. Fortunately for beneficiaries, Social Security law prohibits a negative COLA, so the negative result was ruled out and the COLA for 2016 was zero.

So, the rumor that there will always be a benefit increase in January is untrue, although having only three zero COLA years since the start of automated adjustments in 1974 leads folks to assume there will always be a boost in the new year. The size of the adjustment fluctuates with economic cycles and has ranged from a high of 14.3 percent in 1980 to 0.3% in 2017 (excluding, of course, the zero years). Incidentally, the historical average since automatic COLAs began is 3.8%, so the 2024 adjustment of 3.2% isn't that far from the average

Prince George's County Encourages Residents to "Be Flood Smart" During Flood Awareness Month

Residents and businesses are encouraged to make a flood plan

LARGO, Md. (June 7, 2024)— June marks the beginning of hurricane season, and severe weather conditions can cause flooding, threaten lives, and damage property. The Department of the Environment (DoE) wants to help County residents and business owners protect their homes, buildings, and personal belongings if flooding occurs and to be flood-ready, flood-smart, and flood-safe.

The best time to make a flood plan is now. DoE offers flood prevention tips and information, as well as a Flood Awareness poster that provides information on what causes flooding and how to prevent and protect homes and businesses in the case of a flood. View a copy of the proclamation issued by County Executive Angela Alsobrooks recognizing June as Flood Awareness Month.

DoE, in partnership with the Prince George's Office of Homeland Security and Mary-

land Insurance Administration, is hosting "Be Flood Smart: Flood Educational Virtual Sessions" every Thursday in June. This flood education series will equip residents with information and resources to improve their understanding of how and where floods occur, share techniques and practical measures for flood risk reduction, and prepare for disaster response and recovery. Register for the sessions at bit.ly/befloodsmart.

Other flood management resources are available on the U.S. Department of Homeland Security website to help residents prepare and provide guidance on making a flood plan. It also includes information on flood insurance premiums, which County residents can save up to 25 percent. Another resource, Alert Prince George's, is a text message notification service that advises subscribers in the event of significant flooding.

Residents can implement grassroots solutions to prevent and alleviate flooding and should follow these safety tips when encountering flooding:

 Avoid walking or driving through floodwaters.

• If flash flooding is possible, move immediately to higher ground.

• If floodwaters rise around your car, but the water is not moving, abandon the car and walk to higher ground. Do not leave the vehicle if you enter moving water.

Avoid camping or parking along streams, rivers, and creeks during heavy rainfall. These areas can flood quickly and with little warning.

Having flood insurance is one way to prepare for flooding, as coverage helps pay for damage to your home's structure and/or contents. For information on insurance rates and tips, visit the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Flood Risks and Costs webpage.

The County also participates in FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS) Program. CRS stresses the importance of informing residents of flood hazards and reducing flood risks. The County recently updated its Hazard Mitigation Plan, which FEMA approved in November 2023. This Plan covers the Prince George's County and the City of Laurel jurisdictions and provides current flood risk information and measures to mitigate the risk.

The Internet of Animals: **Global Wildlife Tracking Now A Reality**

Dear EarthTalk:

What is the so-called "Internet of Animals" project all about and how does it aim to help the conservation cause?

In the early 2000s, animal behavior specialist Martin Wikelski was reflecting on the value of monitoring wildlife, which had already been the bulk of his work for decades. Be it through putting GPS chips on birds to understand their migration patterns, or placing radio collars on coyotes to follow their movements through urban areas, it was undeniable that using technology to monitor the movements and physiology of wildlife species was the best way to learn more about their behaviors and habitats.

However, Wikelski knew from experience that monitoring animals had limitations. Only the largest mammals and birds could be monitored due to the large size of GPS technology, and the energy needed to complete monitoring projects was monumental. In an effort to make monitoring more viable on larger scales, Wikelski came up with the idea for an "Internet of Animals": A satellite system that would continuously receive monitoring data from GPS chips placed on animals around the world.

Wikelski soon founded the International Cooperation for Animal Research Using Space (ICARUS) program to bolster his efforts in monitoring smaller creatures. The idea was to develop a chip that was small enough to be placed on more than half of the mammalian species living on Earth, around 40 percent of all birds, and hundreds of reptilian species. These chips would collect temperature, location and accelerometer data and promptly send the data up to a network of low orbit satellites in Earth's atmosphere called "CubeSats", which would in turn send the signals to "Movebank", an online public database. (Accelerometers are used to measure sedentary time, physical activity, physical activity energy expenditure, and sleep-related behaviors.) After decades of development and design, the technology has now been testing the project on smaller scales for more than half a decade.

If ICARUS succeeds in launching a sustainable, broad-scale version of the "internet of animals", the benefits the project would bring to environmental research are nearly infinite. For starters, getting more consistent insight into animals' behaviors and biology could help scientists understand the main threats to wildlife and their habitats to better conserve them.

Additionally, information on meteorology and climate could be provided by creatures that are especially sensitive to inclement weather and temperature changes; for example, elephant seals already provide more than 80 percent of our sea surface temperature data. And that's to say nothing of the potential discoveries that could be made in biology and zoology to further inform our understanding of the climate crisis and conservation.

There are still many challenges that must be overcome before the internet of animals goes online. The GPS chips need to be reliable enough to give accurate data for months or years without malfunctioning, or else the project will not be physically or financially sustainable. That's a lot of pressure to put on a device the size of a nickel. However, with the project already in testing, and financial backing being provided by NASA and several national governments, it may not be long before Wikelski's dream becomes a reality.

Prince George's County Announces New Clear the Curb **Waste Collection Services Beginning July 1**

Introduces new curbside scrap metal and electronics recycling pickup and increases collection of curbside bulky items

LARGO, Md. (June 4, 2024) — Beginning the week of July 1, 2024, Prince George's County is expanding its Clear the Curb waste collection services for residents receiving County-contracted trash and recycling pickup. The new services will increase the number of acceptable curbside bulky trash items from two (2) to four (4) and introduce monthly curbside scrap metal and electronics recycling appointments. These enhanced services will continue modernizing and streamlining our current residential collection services.

"We are excited to introduce these new Clear the Curb collection services demonstrating our continued commitment to providing value-added services to residents receiving County-contracted trash and recycling collection," says Department of the Environment Director Andrea Crooms. "These long-term investments help reduce waste, increase recycling, protect our environment, and maintain a cleaner and greener County.'

In 2022, the County introduced a faster and improved curbside bulky trash pickup, allowing residents to place two (2) bulky items or two (2) tightly secured bags with small household items next to their trash can. Starting in July, residents can place four (4) items or four (4) tightly secured bags for pickup.

The new curbside scrap metal and electronics recycling collection will be offered by appointment only on the third Monday of each month. The first day of service begins July 15 and can be scheduled online or by contacting PGC311. Scrap tires, white goods, and other appliances will continue to be scheduled for pickup through PGC311.

To implement these new curbside collection services, some residents will experience a change in their current trash and recycling collection day. Residents impacted will receive a door hanger from their waste collection hauler, a postcard mailer, and other communication available on social media and the Department of the website Environment's mvpgc.us/clearthecurb.

Residents may verify their waste collection day bit.ly/PGCcollectiondaylookup by entering their household address in the search bar and reviewing the list in the white pop-up box. If a new collection day has been assigned, it will be noted along with the day of other waste collection services.

Governor Moore Signs Executive Order to Advance Maryland's Pollution Reduction Plan

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (June 4, 2024)—Governor Wes Moore today signed an executive order to advance Maryland's Climate Pollution Reduction Plan. The order—one of the most comprehensive on climate change issued by a Maryland governor—directs a whole-of-government approach to address climate change, including requiring agencies to submit a Climate Implementation Plan by Nov. 1, action to propose new emissions standards, and the creation of the Governor's Subcabinet on Climate.

"Climate action is about more than avoiding disaster. It's about growing opportunity, and that's what today is about," said Gov. Moore "The climate crisis didn't start overnight. It will take time and decisive action for us to tackle it. But we canand we will—win this moment. We will win because we work together, we will win because we tackle our goals with action, and we will win because we leave no one behind."

In December 2023, the Marvland Department of the Environment released Maryland's Climate Pollution Reduction Plan to support the goals of the Climate Solutions Now Act of 2022, which requires Maryland to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 60 percent below 2006 levels by 2031 and reach net zero emissions by 2045. The Climate Pollution Reduction Plan estimates that the implementation of new climate policies will generate up to \$1.2 billion in public health benefits, a \$2.5 billion increase in personal income for Marylanders, and a net gain of 27,400 jobs between now and 2031.

agencies are required to consult the Maryland Department of the Environment to submit a Climate Implementation Plan to the governor by November 1. The report must include steps and a timeline for implementation for all required actions within each agency's purview. Agencies are also required to consider Justice40 goals, initiatives, and funding to more comprehensively advance environmental justice.

The executive order also directs the Maryland Department of the Environment to take immediate action on climate change by proposing a zero-emission heating equipment standard regulation and a clean heat standard regulation, in addition to working with Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative states to establish a new regional cap for carbon dioxide emissions from power plants that align with Maryland and partner states' 100% clean energy goals.

"It's no secret that we face significant challenges from climate change," said Maryland Department of the Environment Secretary Serena McIlwain. "Hotter summers, severe weather, flooding, increased asthma cases—especially among children in disadvantaged communities—all underscore the urgent need for action. This Executive Order is not just a call for action, but a vision for a brighter tomorrow."

The order also calls for the Maryland Energy Administration to establish a framework for a clean energy standard to achieve 100% clean energy by 2035 and directs the Maryland Department of Transportation to undertake several measures to promote clean transportation.

The Governor's Subcabinet on Climate will be chaired by Secretary McIlwain and

In accordance with the order, all State vice-chaired by Chief Sustainability Officer Meghan Conklin. The subcabinet will drive a unified approach within state government to implement Maryland's Climate Pollution Reduction Plan and will be required to report on Maryland's progress by December 1 this year and annually thereafter.

Governor Moore signed the executive order this afternoon following participation in a student climate change discussion panel at Henderson-Hopkins School in Baltimore, which participates in the Maryland Community Solar program Solar4Us. Through solar panels on the school's roof, the program will provide an estimated 150 families in the community with discounted electricity bills, amounting to a minimum of \$1.1 million saved over the lifetime of the system.

"This Executive Order is the most comprehensive EO on climate change ever issued by a Maryland governor," said Maryland League of Conservation Voters Executive Director Kim Coble. "Maryland LCV applauds the Moore Administration for leading through actions and prioritizing equity as Maryland tackles the impacts of climate change."

"It is so fitting that Governor Moore is signing his executive order at Henderson Hopkins. We have students who have participated in a climate summit, deeply care about these issues, and just advised the governor on what matters most to them" said Henderson-Hopkins School Principal Peter Kannam. "Additionally, Henderson Hopkins has partnered with Climate Access Fund to have our roof dedicated to solar power for the community."
