Mr. Prather Hosts Inaugural Move With Mr. Prather Live! in Bowie

BOWIE, Md. (Aug. 30, 2025)—It was a morning of fun, laughter, and joy all in the name of learning thanks to Azel Prather, affectionately known as Mr. Prather. The Prince George's County native hosted his inaugural Move With Mr. Prather Live! at the Bowie Center for the Performing Arts on Saturday, August 30, drawing more than 500 children, parents, and families for a morning of music, movement, and community celebration.

Though this marks the firstever Move With Mr. Prather Live, Mr. Prather is no stranger to the spotlight as a philanthropist, educator, and community leader in the DMV. For more than 10 years, he has served children locally, nationally, and abroad through his nonprofit, The Prather Foundation, from childhood programming and family support in Ghana, to programming in states such as Georgia and West Virginia. His commitment to children's edu-

cation and joy has even earned him a feature on The Ellen De-Generes Show.

Launching the live experience in Bowie held special significance, as it pays homage to the community that raised and continually supports his efforts. To ensure that families across the county could attend. Mr. Prather partnered with local organizations such as Ms. Frazier's Day Care, Zion Church, First Baptist Church of Glenarden, and the D.C. Chapter of the Daddy Stroller Club, which brings awareness to postpartum depression in fathers. Together, they helped make the event accessible to families throughout the region. The production itself reflected one of Mr. Prather's deepest commitments: empowering young people. The event was staged in collaboration with Do The Work DC, a youth-led creative production company founded by Maryland native Aia Sophia and powered by teens and young adults ages 14-21.

LARGO, Md. (Sept. 4, 2025)—The Prince George's County Planning Board of The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) announced today during its meeting the retirements of Vice Chair Dorothy F. Bailey, effective August 30, 2025, and

Commissioner A. Shuanise Washington, effective October 1, 2025.

In Prince George's County, all members of the M-NCPPC Planning Board are appointed by the County Executive, subject to approval of the County Council. Vice Chair Bailey was first appointed to the Planning Board in July 2011 and reappointed in October 2015 and October 2019. Commissioner

Washington was first appointed to the Planning Board in July 2011 and reappointed in October 2012 and November 2016. The County Executive will appoint the next Planning Board members to fill the vacant positions, which are set to expire June 15, 2027, and June 15, 2028.

have been tremendous assets to M-NCPPC and our work in Prince George's County over the past 14 years," says Chairman Darryl Barnes. Eastover Auto Merges With Parts Authority

Eastover Auto Supply recently underwent a big change. As of September 2, Eastover has merged with Parts Authority and moved in with their Earl's Discount Auto

Parts branch. In spring of 1982, Eastover Auto was ailing—on the verge of closing—when Will Foreman decided to take a chance on

A year earlier, Will had left his position as events manager at the Towson Center, Towson University, to take a job at Southeast Auto Supply. He couldn't resist the opportunity to strike out on his own in Eas-

In his first month running Eastover Auto, Will decided he needed help. He called on his friend, Towson Center building manager John McHale (incidentally, my son) who agreed to give Eastover Auto

It would prove to be a big adjustment for John. "He couldn't tell a spark plug from a brake shoe," Will said. John agreed, "I knew nothing."

He learned quickly, however.

In an era of print catalogues and paper price sheets, he had to memorize as much as possible just to keep up.

Soon, the store built a loyal base of auto-repair shops, government facilities, and regular walk-in customers, drawn to Eastover's signature mix of deep knowledge and good-natured banter.

Long-time supporters included Morn- John—is joining Parts Authority as they ingside Councilman John Anthony and former Morningsider Wayne McKeown.

Across the years, the catalogues were replaced by computers.

The staff changed. Though some people—like Wayne Brown—have stayed around for decades and become family.

Some staff, literally, were family. My daughter Elaine and grandson Conor have both worked there across the years, and Will's children all pitched in when they were in high school.

One by one, the other independent auto parts stores have gone out of business or been bought by national chains. Through it all, Will and John, "joined at the hip," as Will says, have kept Eastover Auto going. In 2014, lease changes forced Eastover Auto to leave its original home in Eastover Shopping Center and relocate to a space behind the Forestville Fire Department and across the street from the old Murray's

Eastover Auto adjusted to the new location, aggressively building online sales through eBay and Amazon, and the customer base grew significantly by reaching new customers across the U.S. and all over

In the wake of COVID, however, their main supplier went bankrupt, forcing Eastover Auto to find a new path forward.

Each recipient provided the standard scholarship documentation, including a resume, transcripts (high school or college), references, and proof of residence in County Council District 8. The application process reinforces PGCDPC's commitment to supporting academically talented students who are rooted in the community they serve.

Thoughtful Reflections on Maryland's Edibles Law

As part of the scholarship experience, recipients contributed essays addressing current Maryland law regarding adults 21 and over for personal use of edible products. Key takeaways from the essays illustrate the nuanced perspectives that young scholars bring to the table:

Simone Forrest emphasized that risk does not vanish with age; instead, it can become more complex, underscoring the need for ongoing education and thoughtful policy.

Webster Jackson offered a concern about home production, noting safety risks and challenges in dosage accuracy without professional oversight, and the implications for regulation and enforcement.

Adrian Sison reflected on experiential learning from his school community, suggesting that if individuals could control edible content more reliably, it might mitigate hospital visits and enhance safety.

To Be Equal:

Louisiana's Attack on the **Voting Rights Act Deepens America's Civil Rights State of Emergency**

"The vote is precious. It is almost sacred. It is the most powerful nonviolent tool we have in a democratic society, and we must use it."

American democracy is under siege. As the nation approaches landmark civil rights anniversaries, efforts are underway in several states to dismantle long-standing protections, most alarmingly, Louisiana's recent petition to gut the Voting Rights Act (VRA).

Louisiana has taken the extraordinary step of refusing to defend its own congressional map, which includes two majority-Black districts, and instead urged the U.S. Supreme Court to strike down race-conscious redistricting frameworks established by Thornburg v. Gingles in 1986. That precedent ensures minority populations have a fair chance to elect representatives of their choosing. The state's attorney general argues that such redistricting is unconstitutional under the Equal Protection Clause, effectively challenging the applicability of Section 2 of the VRA. The case is scheduled to return to the Supreme Court on October 15, 2025, as reported by Politico and MSNBC.

This move is more than a legal maneuver. It is a direct assault on Black political power. Legal scholars warn that if successful, it would pave the way for fewer majority-minority districts not only in Louisiana but across the nation, decimating representation in Congress, statehouses, and local governments.

The stakes are stark. As the 2025 State of Black America® report reveals, America's civil rights and democratic systems are in a state of emergency. The report outlines escalating efforts, from legislative rollback to coordinated disinformation, aimed at erasing decades of hard-won protections. This year's theme is clear: democracy cannot withstand silence or delay.

Louisiana's maneuver arrives at a critical moment. Black Louisianans make up nearly one-third of the state's population. Only after extensive legal pressure did the state adopt a second majority-Black district for the 2024 elections. That change came following a federal court ruling in favor of Black voters under Section 2 of the VRA, which the U.S. Supreme Court allowed to stand in 2024. Now, the very legal framework that enabled that progress is under attack.

This is not an isolated incident. It is part of a national pattern of voter suppression by design. The State of Black America report outlines that 27 states have passed legislation in the past five years that directly restricts access to the ballot through voter roll purges, reduced polling locations, gerrymandering, and ID laws that disproportionately harm communities of color.

But dismantling the Voting Rights Act is not only a legal loss. It is a political and moral crisis. Black elected officials, advocates, and all who believe in representative democracy must respond with urgency.

What must be done:

- Hold national leadership accountable. Congress must act immediately to reauthorize and strengthen the Voting Rights Act by passing legislation such as the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act.
- Mobilize civic resistance. Civil rights organizations, faith-based coalitions, and local community leaders must engage in robust organizing, voter education, and legal defense efforts to effectively address the challenges facing their communities.
- **Invest in political equity.** Foundations, public institutions, and allies must direct resources toward safeguarding Black electoral participation and representation.

The crisis is clear. The solutions are within reach. The legacy of John Lewis, Fannie Lou Hamer, and so many others reminds us that the right to vote must never be taken for granted.

To be equal, we must protect the most powerful tool we have, the vote, and resist every attempt to take it away.

Maryland Protects Access to Vaccines for All Marylanders

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (Sept. 5, 2025)—This respiratory virus season, Maryland is protecting vaccine access for Marylanders of all ages. As federal government uncertainty around vaccine policy has raised questions for many, Maryland public health officials will continue to use science-based guidance to be a trusted resource for people to keep themselves and their families safe and healthy.

Marylanders can continue to access vaccines at provider offices and pharmacies across the state as vaccine supply is available. Marylanders should talk to their health care provider about what vaccines are best for themselves and their families.

"The federal government's rapid changes and unnecessary swirl around vaccine policy is harmful for Marylanders and all Americans, and could result in disastrous public health outcomes," said Gov. Moore. "The health, safety and well-being of Marylanders and their loved ones are our North Star, and we will do everything in our power to ensure they have access to life-saving medicines like vaccines.

Maryland is well-equipped to weather the federal-level complexities and challenges creating hurdles to access. To protect Marylanders' access to vaccines, Governor Moore signed legislation to ensure that insurance providers—including Medicaid and private insurers—continue to cover the cost of all vaccines recommended by the ACIP as of December 31, 2024. Effective June 1, 2025, this protects against the withdrawal of vaccine coverage for a range of illnesses, not just COVID-19. In addition, in 2024, Governor Moore signed into law legislation to expand vaccination authority for pharmacists, allowing them to administer flu and COVID vaccines without a prescription to anyone 3 years and

For decades, vaccine recommendations have been made through deliberative, multi-factorial processes guided by science. While the standards and sources for federal vaccine guidance are now uncertain, Maryland maintains its commitment to careful and evidence-based decision-making for patient safety and disease prevention. Immunization policy is guided by multiple entities in Maryland, including the Maryland Department of Health, the Maryland Insurance Administration, and the Board of Pharmacy. up to date on all vaccines recommended for their child.

"Vaccines continue to be one of the most powerful public health tools for safeguarding our people and communities against disease," said Maryland Department of Health Secretary Dr. Meena Seshamani. "As potential changes to federal vaccine guidance loom, Maryland is working to ensure minimal interruptions to vaccine access. We continue to work closely with our partners and are actively exploring all options to protect our communities."

Immunizations are available from most providers statewide, including pharmacists, who are authorized in Maryland to give vaccines without a prescription, in accordance with Maryland law. For COVID vaccines specifically, vaccines are available at healthcare providers and pharmacies across the state, although the specific assessment processes may vary based on location.

For children, school immunization requirements have not changed. COVID-19 vaccines are not currently required for students under this schedule, but schools may implement their own recommendations and requirements for attendance. Families should talk to their pediatrician about ensuring their children are

"If you can imagine getting a letter saying you owe \$700, \$800, \$900, or more in lunch debt, that can be very scary for families," said Council Member Adams-Stafford, a former member of the PGCPS Board of Education. Ask Rusty:

Can I Claim My Own SS **Benefit Now and Get Half** of My Husband's Benefit Later?

Dear Rusty: I would like to get an answer concerning taking my Social Security benefit soon and switching to my spouse's benefit when he begins to take his. I am 64 years, 9 months old and my husband is 65 years, 7 months. My benefit is low due to the fact that I did not work for about 25 years while raising our children. My benefit would be \$573 at age 65. My husband's benefit at age 67 will be \$3,326. My first question is: can I receive half of my husband's benefit once he begins drawing his? Secondly, if I draw my benefit now will that reduce the amount I can draw from his benefit later? Signed: Uncertain Spouse

Dear Uncertain: As you may know, the full retirement age (FRA) for both you and your husband is 67. If either of you claim before your FRA your monthly SS retirement amount will be permanently reduced and, if you are currently working, you will be subject to Social Security's Annual Earnings Test (AET) which limits how much you can earn while collecting early benefits. The earnings limit for early filers is \$23,400 for 2025 (changes yearly) and, if that is exceeded, SS will take away some of your benefits (\$1 for every \$2 over the limit). They "take away" by withholding future payments until the penalty is satisfied.

That said, if you claim your personal SS "soon" (e.g., at age 65), you will get about 87% of the amount you would get by waiting until your FRA to claim. You would, indeed, get a "spousal boost" when your husband claims, but you would not get 50% of his age 67 amount. That's because of the way spouse benefits are calculated. When your husband claims, you will get a "spousal boost" added to your early benefit amount (\$573?). The amount of that spousal boost will be computed as ½ of your husband's FRA amount (e.g., \$1663), minus your FRA entitlement (likely about \$661) for a spousal boost of about \$1002. But since you won't have yet reached your FRA when your husband claims, the amount of the spousal boost will also be reduced (to about \$926), which will be added to your age 65 amount of \$573 for a total monthly spousal benefit of about \$1499.

So, the answers to your two questions are:

1. Because you claimed your Social Security retirement benefit early and won't yet be your full retirement age when your husband claims, you will not get half of your husband's benefit when he claims. You would likely get about 45% of his benefit.

2. If you take your own SS retirement benefit now, you will get a higher benefit when your husband claims, but the amount you get will be less than half of his FRA entitlement.

The only way you can get the full 50% of your husband's FRA benefit entitlement is to wait until your own full retirement age to claim Social Security.

Prince George's County Educators Win **New Contract That Supports, Strengthens Classroom Learning**

Ratified three-year contract meets PGCEA's vision for the future by valuing and respecting teachers

PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY, Md. (Sept. 3, 2025)—An overwhelming majority of members of the Prince George's County Educators' Association (PGCEA) voted to ratify a new three-year contract with Prince George's County Public Schools. Prince George's County has outstanding educators who are deeply committed to helping every student thrive—in the classroom, and in life.

The agreement educators won focuses on ensuring that teachers have the tools, time, and support necessary to provide every student with the education they deserve. It also includes meaningful wage increases to recruit and retain talented educators, provides greater support to teachers to ensure safer classrooms, and streamlines grading reports to save teachers valuable time.

"This contract delivers on what our schools need: safer classrooms, fair workloads, and respect for educators. When we

support teachers, students thrive. This is a win for all of Prince George's County," said Dr. Donna Christy, PGCEA President.

Highlights of the contract include:

- Fair wages to attract and retain talented educators: The new contract improves starting salaries and includes 9% in cost-of-living pay over the life of the contract. With higher prices for food, gas, housing, and other essentials, this contract will help attract and retain experienced educators.
- Less paperwork, more time for stu**dents:** Under this agreement, grades go into one system that streamlines the grading process, giving teachers more time to focus on helping students succeed.
- Safer classrooms for students and ed**ucators:** Every parent wants their child in a safe classroom where learning can come first. Under this agreement, if a student shows repeated aggressive behavior, a safety plan is put in place right away. Both students and teachers get the support they need.
- **Support for special educators and** dents, and the community we serve.

service providers managing heavy caseloads: For service providers like special educators and counselors, heavy caseloads mean less individual attention for each child. This agreement provides oversight to ensure students don't fall through the cracks.

"We're so proud of PGCEA educators —they make a tremendous difference in the lives of students each and every day," said Prince George's County Executive Aisha Braveboy.

The significant contract between the educators and the second-largest school district in Maryland will cover PGCEA's 10,000 members including licensed educators and specialized instructional support professionals. Once ratified and approved by the Board of Education of Prince George's County School Board, all economic provisions of the contract will be retroactive to July 1.

Maryland Congressional Delegation Members Announce \$726,497 to Support Students at Prince George's, **Montgomery County Community Colleges**

WASHINGTON (Sept. 2, 2025)—Today, U.S. Senators Chris Van Hollen and Angela Alsobrooks and U.S. Representatives Steny Hoyer, Jamie Raskin, Glenn Ivey and April McClain Delaney (all D-Md.) announced \$726,497 in federal funding for community colleges in Prince George's and Montgomery Counties to support low-income students, first-generation students, and students with dis-

abilities as they pursue higher education.

"A quality education opens doors to good-paying jobs and meaningful opportunities, but many still face unnecessary and unfair barriers to academic achievement—especially when it comes to college. These federal investments will enable community colleges in Prince George's and Montgomery Counties to provide students with the resources they need to overcome obstacles and succeed in college and beyond," said the lawmakers

The federal grants have been awarded as follows:

- \$440,388 to Prince George's Community College
- \$286,109 to Montgomery College

The federal funding comes from the

U.S. Department of Education's TRIO Student Support Services grant program, which supports preparation and guidance for students as they pursue education beyond high school. This program was funded at \$1.91 billion through the FY25 government funding bill.

EarthTalk® Cheating on Emissions: A Problem for All Automakers?

Dear EarthTalk:

I heard that VW and Toyota were fined for cheating on emissions tests for new vehicles. Why did they do this and are all of the car companies likely cheating?

Emissions testing plays an essential role in controlling vehicle pollution and conserving the environment. These evaluations confirm that vehicles comply with legal regulations for the release of harmful gases such as carbon dioxide and nitrogen oxides. Nonetheless, certain car producers have been discovered to be cheating in these evalua-

The main motive for this is monetary. Achieving emissions standards frequently necessitates costly technologies such as sophisticated catalytic converters or more environmentally friendly engine designs. For car manufacturers, these enhancements may reduce profits or increase vehicle prices for buyers, possibly leading to lower sales. By engaging in deceit, companies can evade these expenses while still seeming to adhere to regulations. Moreover, tougher emissions regulations in areas such as the European Union and the U.S.

exert notable pressure on manufacturers to innovate quickly. When deadlines appear unattainable, certain automakers resort to shortcuts by altering test outcomes.

Cheating also helps preserve a company's reputation. For example, VW heavily marketed its "Clean Diesel" vehicles as Eco-friendly alternatives, but later investigations revealed the use of defeat devices—software designed to manipulate results during tests. These devices made cars appear cleaner while emitting up to 40 times the legal limit of pollutants in real-world driving. Toyota was recently fined for cheating, showing that even trusted industry leaders sometimes prioritize profits over compliance.

Other manufacturers have also faced accusations. Nissan falsified emissions data in Japan due to poorly managed testing systems. Opel was also found using defeat devices in Europe in 2015. And BMW was involved in an "emissions cartel" that sought to limit progress in AdBlue, a technology designed to decrease nitrogen oxide (NOx) emissions. Even Mercedes-Benz faced allegations of using defeat devices, though the company refutes the claims. John Stoll explains, "The emissions information says what the test needs it to say so that it passes regulatory tests. And then in realworld conditions, it emits far more of the harmful

emissions such as NOx into the air than is legally allowed."

While it's unlikely that every car company cheats, the problem appears widespread enough to warrant concern. Weak enforcement and the potential for profit make cheating an attractive option for unethical companies. Nonetheless, many manufacturers do focus on compliance and put resources into cleaner technologies, demonstrating that innovation can occur without resorting to fraud.

To tackle emissions fraud, authorities need to enhance enforcement and apply stricter penalties. Third-party organizations should handle emissions tests to ensure impartiality, and carmakers should be incentivized to develop sustainable technologies. As consumers, we can help by choosing vehicles that have confirmed eco-friendly certifications, and insisting on increased transparency from carmakers.






