Councilmember Charles Colbert Appointed as New Mayor in the Town of Upper Marlboro

Derrick Brooks Also Appointed As Vice Mayor Following Recent Town Elections

UPPER MARLBORO, Md. (Jan. 5, 2026)—Councilman Charles Colbert has been appointed as the new Mayor in the Town of Upper Marlboro, Town Manager Clayton A. Anderson announced today. Additionally, Derrick Brooks was appointed as the municipality's new Vice Mayor.

Mayor Colbert and Vice Mayor Brooks were both formally sworn into office last month and will serve through December 2027.

"I am honored to have been se-

lected by my fellow Councilmembers to serve in this important role as your Mayor," Colbert said. "I am eager to get to work as Mayor to make our town an even better place to live, work, and raise a family. We have made significant progress in recent years, especially in downtown economic development, infrastructure improvements, and expanding recreational opportunities for our residents.

"I look forward to working closely with my colleagues on the Council,"

Governor Moore Announces Record Funding to Support Law Enforcement in Proposed FY 2027 Budget Amid Historic Drops in Violent Crime Statewide

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (Jan. 8, 2026)—Governor Wes Moore this morning announced a record \$124.1 million in funding to support law enforcement in the governor's proposed FY 2027 budget. Administered through the State Aid for Police Protection Program, the funding represents the Moore-Miller Administration's continued commitment to making Maryland safer, as the state continues to see historic drops in violent crime.

"Our administration is committed to creating a safer state for every Marylander through an all-of-the-above approach that supports law enforcement, strengthens our communities, and invests in our people," said Gov. Moore. "Our public safety strategy is delivering real results, but we are building on that progress with new investments so that every Marylander can live with the safety and dignity they deserve."

Preliminary data indicate that in 2025:

- Homicides are down 25% statewide—the lowest in nearly 40 years.
- Non-fatal shootings are down 28% statewide compared to 2024.
- Robberies are down more than 25% statewide—extending a decades-long continuous drop in incidents.

Preliminary data indicate that since the Moore-Miller Administration took office:

- Homicides are down 44% across the state, down 58% in Baltimore City

and down 39% in Prince George's County.

- Non-fatal shootings are down 40% statewide.

Since Day One, the Moore-Miller Administration has engaged in an all-of-the-above approach to break the back of violent crime across Maryland. The administration's public safety mission is defined by three core pillars: to provide the resources and support that law enforcement needs; to build stronger, more vibrant communities that leave no one behind; and to coordinate across all aspects of government to make our state safer.

To provide resources and support for law enforcement officials, the governor reinstated full investment in the Maryland Coordination and Analysis Center—including the reintegration of Baltimore City into its operations—to enhance data and information sharing between federal, state, and local entities and drive significant improvements in closure rates. The administration has provided direct funding and grants to support new equipment and overtime; prioritized investment in the Office of the Public Defender; secured landmark investment in the Baltimore State's Attorney's Office; and continued investment with the U.S. Attorney through the Special Assistant U.S. Attorney program to hold criminals accountable—all while working with state and local partners to develop re-entry programming to break the cycle of recidivism.

Most recently, Governor Moore reinstated state law enforcement resources

to support Baltimore City law enforcement, marking the return to a true public safety partnership following the previous administration's termination of similar efforts. The renewed collaboration continues to build upon the historic progress made to reduce violent crime in Baltimore City through enhanced collaboration and community resource deployment.

"Working together across jurisdictional boundaries is critical to the public safety services we provide throughout the state," said Maryland State Police Acting Superintendent Colonel Michael A. Jackson. "At the direction of Governor Moore and working alongside our

local, state, and federal law enforcement partners, we are committed to building on our progress to keep Marylanders safe."

To build stronger, more vibrant communities, the Moore-Miller Administration has been sharply focused on addressing the underlying and generational impacts of policies that not only fail to deter crime, but facilitate the circumstances that lead to it. Through the ENOUGH program, the governor continues to support community-driven action to tackle the root causes of poverty, providing grants to 28 communities; strengthened access to mental and behavioral health supports;

and maintained support for nonprofit and faith-based organizations to help protect against hate crimes.

The administration has also instituted innovative agency-based initiatives to promote intervention, opportunity and education, including the first-ever formal interagency effort to help to families affected by crime and violence through the Safer Stronger Together project. The administration launched the THRIVE Academy to serve youth who are determined to be at a heightened risk for involvement in gun violence; championed initiatives like the Service Year Option to promote access to mentorship and apprenticeship opportunities; and worked hand-in-hand with partners in communities across the state to engage in initiatives to uplift men and boys.

"Governor Wes Moore's partnership and commitment to public safety is real. It is an approach to public safety that has been instrumental to the historic 40% reduction in homicides we've achieved in Prince George's County," said Prince George's County Executive Aisha Braveboy. "The synergy between state and local governments is vital, and it's clear that with today's record funding announcement, in addition to strategic investments the governor and General Assembly have made, we share the view that public safety and economic development are intertwined. In Prince George's County, we look forward to continuing our work with the Moore-Miller Administration to deliver safer, stronger, and more prosperous neighborhoods for county residents."

HISTORIC SITES

Cows grazed in front of Montpelier Manor Farms, c. 1922, in Laurel. Montpelier Mansion is National Historic Landmark. Montpelier was built for Major Thomas Snowden and, in the twentieth century, was the home of assistant secretary of state Breckinridge Long. (Submitted by Friends of Montpelier.)

The historic and elegant mansion in Riverdale, at the time of its construction in 1801, was one of the finest examples of Georgian architecture inexistence. Modeled after the Chateau du Mick, the home of Baron de Stier in Belgium, the house was made of brick, stuccoed, and painted. The mansion was home to a branch of the Calvert family for much of the nineteenth century. Mount Calvert in Croom was built in the 1700s by John Brown and remained in the family until 1835 when it was sold to Captain John Brooks. Mount Calvert is the only historic structure remaining in the site of Charles Town, the first seat of Prince George’s County government. More modest in scale than the county’s other Federal-Style mansions, it is an outstanding example of this type, distinguished also by its scenic location overlooking the confluence of the Western Branch and the Patuxent River. (Jan. 5, 2026)—The Southern Maryland National Heritage Area today announced the launch of its new regional passport program, an interactive initiative designed to encourage residents and visitors to discover the region’s storied past, abundant culture, and natural beauty across Calvert, Charles, St. Mary’s, and Southern Prince George’s Counties.

Fifteen designated heritage sites throughout the Area are now offering complimentary passport booklets to visitors. The passports feature space for unique stamps to commemorate visits to participating locations—visit a new heritage site, get a new stamp designed for that site. he added, “along with elected officials at the federal, state, county, and local levels, to continue the recent progress we have made.”

Colbert was the top vote-getter in the recently held Nov. 4 Town elections, finishing with 115 votes. Councilmember and former Mayor Sarah Franklin placed second with 108 votes, while Brooks was third with 107 votes. Incumbent Councilmember Karen Lott finished fourth with 103 votes, followed by fellow incumbent Joseph “Joe” Hourcle at 68.

Colbert is a Prince George’s County native and dedicated public servant. He first entered public service in 2022 as a Town Commissioner and later served as a Councilmember following the Town’s transition to a Council. In December 2025, he was selected by his fellow Councilmembers to serve as Mayor.

Colbert is committed to transparent governance, community engagement, and thoughtful growth that honors the Town’s rich history. Mayor Colbert focuses on advancing economic vitality, improving infrastructure, enhancing resident services, and ensuring the community has a strong voice in local government. Outside of office, he brings experience in business operations and government contracting, and is a devoted husband and father actively involved in the Upper Marlboro community.

To Be Equal:

ICE Has Ushered in a New Era of Domestic Terror and Attacks on Civil Liberties

“The Party told you to reject the evidence of your eyes and ears. It was their final, most essential command.”

—George Orwell, 1984

“Don’t believe your lying eyes.”

The quote, which originated in the Marx Brothers’ movie Duck Soup in 1933, has been deployed in a variety of contexts by comics, authors, and orators, leaning into irony for nearly a century.

I never thought that I would see the day when the federal government would use it to defend the execution of an American citizen on American soil, in broad daylight, on camera. That is precisely

what occurred on the morning of January 7, when 37-year-old wife and mother, Renee Nicole Good, was shot at point-blank range by an immigration enforcement officer as she tried to leave the scene of a protest in Minneapolis.

The shooting has ignited a firestorm of controversy for a number of reasons. Since this administration has accelerated its ruthless immigration enforcement activities, sending masked, armed officers with minimal training and experience into major cities primarily led by political opponents, nine people have been shot by agents.

But the driving factor behind this outrage was the federal government’s response. Leaders from immigration enforcement to the office of the Vice

President took to social media and the airwaves to not only place blame on the deceased, but also to outright lie by stating that the driver attempted to assault officers with her vehicle. An accusation that was clearly debunked by videos from multiple angles of the incident.

Beyond the government’s willingness to lie without compunction, perhaps, the most chilling part of this story is the message it sends to the American people. A message that says that the state can do anything that it wants to you, including claiming your life, and not only will there be no effort to bring your assailant, this case killer, to justice, but they will be justified.

For millions of Americans, entering the new year emboldened to take a stand against a government that has seemingly gone rogue. Americans had just set down their New Year’s Eve party hats when the news broke of the White House abandoning the balance of power that requires Congress to approve acts of war when it decided to take over Venezuela.

Less than a week later, an American is killed, not by a foreign government or terror organization from abroad, but by her own government. And not for breaking the law or even fully exercising her right to peacefully protest as protected by the 1st Amendment of our Constitution. But for simply being in the vicinity of one.

In a time when efforts to ramp up immigrant enforcement are juxtaposed with a deepening erosion of privacy, we are entering uncharted waters. When immigration enforcement can track and tar-

get Americans without permission through cell towers and social media, we have entered a police state. A police state that can question you without cause, charge you with an increasingly broadening definition of “domestic terrorism” under NSPM-7, and federal officers can take your life on camera simply because they want to.

In African American communities, we are no strangers to surveillance and overpolicing. From the Jim Crow laws enacted during Reconstruction and the CIA-led tactics to suppress Civil Rights organizations in the 1960s to the countless deaths caused by officers and vigilantes who have been exonerated by simply stating they “feared for their lives,” Black life in America is a cautionary tale for what is to come.

It is also a blueprint for elected officials, community leaders, and legal professionals to take a stand against the criminal activity of rogue officers emboldened by corrupt leaders.

As we mourn the death of Renee Good and hope for the speedy recovery of the two people shot just a day after her by ICE officers in Portland, Oregon, we denounce state-sanctioned violence in all forms. We stand by the 1st Amendment clauses that protect free speech and the right to protest peacefully. We stand by the 4th Amendment’s protection of American citizens from unreasonable search and seizure, where, as we saw in the disturbing videos in Minneapolis, far too often result in death and/or serious injury. And we stand beside Americans fighting for justice against tyranny in all forms.

Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty:

Why Didn’t My Friend’s Wife Get All Her SS Immediately?

Dear Rusty: A friend told me about what he believes is a strange thing in the Social Security system. His wife reached her full retirement age (FRA) of 66 several years ago. She delayed filing for Social Security past her FRA and claimed on her 68th birthday in June of that year, exactly 2 years after her FRA. When she filed, she was told she would receive approximately \$300/month, which, of course, was more than she would have received at her FRA. She was told however that she would only receive \$300/month as of January 1 of the following year. Between June of the year she turned 68 and filed for SS until the end of that year, she would receive an amount less than \$300. This lower amount was the amount she would have received if she had filed in December, the year she turned 67. She said she was told that was how SS works. She would never receive the difference in benefits she lost from June through December of the year she filed. If the above is true, can you explain? **Signed: Astounded Friend**

Dear Astounded: What your friend described is, indeed, a unique methodology for how Social Security handles benefit payments for those who choose to wait beyond their full retirement age (FRA) to claim SS benefits. To understand it, let me first describe how Social Security retirement benefits are calculated.

At full retirement age, a person is entitled to 100% of the SS benefit they have earned from a lifetime of working. That FRA benefit amount is known as the person’s “Primary Insurance Amount” (PIA) and is based upon the highest earning 35 years over the individual’s lifetime. From those past years, average lifetime monthly earnings are computed, known as the person’s “Average Indexed Monthly Earnings” (AIME). Their AIME is subjected to a formula which yields their Primary Insurance Amount – the benefit the person is entitled to in the month they attain their full retirement age – typically about 40% of the person’s average monthly lifetime earnings. However, if the person chooses to do so, they can wait beyond their FRA to claim Social Security to get a monthly benefit even higher than their PIA, by earning Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs).

DRCs are applied to the person’s PIA when they claim Social Security. For each month after FRA the person claims, they will have .667% added to their PIA. That means that for each full year of delay, that person will get an extra 8% added to their PIA. For someone (like your friend’s wife) who claimed 24 months after her FRA, she would receive a benefit 16% higher than her FRA amount. However, Social Security normally only applies DRCs in January of each year.

So, even though your friend’s wife claimed her SS benefits in June, 24 months after her FRA, she would initially only get the DRCs she had accumulated through the end of the previous year - in this case, about 18 months’ worth of DRCs, or an SS payment about 12% higher than her PIA (her FRA amount). She would not get her remaining earned DRCs (another 4%) until January of the following year. So, in effect, the wife’s initial benefit didn’t reflect all her earned DRCs until her later January benefit payment. Thus, the wife essentially lost that extra benefit money for the period between June and December of the year she claimed Social Security. In other words, she wouldn’t get the full 16% amount until SS applied the additional 4% DRCs to her benefit payment the following January. And that is why your friend’s wife initially received a payment a bit less than the \$300 Social Security said she was entitled to by waiting 2 years after her FRA to claim.

This surprises many who choose to wait beyond their full retirement age to claim Social Security. But, curiously, this process doesn’t apply to those who wait until age 70 to claim their SS benefits. For those who wait until age 70 to claim, Social Security will immediately apply all DRCs that they have accumulated and provide them with their maximum SS benefit immediately.

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Governor Moore Announces New Maryland.gov, Improving Access to State Benefits, Services, and Resources

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (Jan. 6, 2025)—Governor Wes Moore today unveiled the fully rebuilt Maryland.gov, which transforms the state’s official website into a user-friendly “digital front door,” improving how residents can access critical benefits, government services, and resources. Built on a modern platform centered on an accessible design, the new Maryland.gov is a major step forward in the administration’s commitment to deliver world-class customer service and more efficient government for all Marylanders.

“In Maryland, we leave no one behind. This includes how we serve and connect with our people online,” said Gov. Moore. “This new website is proof that state government can be fast, efficient, and collaborative, replacing bureaucratic mazes with a simple, accessible path to the resources Marylanders need.”

The redesign of the State’s flagship website was spearheaded by the Maryland Department of Information Technology’s Maryland Digital Service, which Governor Moore created via executive action to enhance State websites and web applications. The work to transform Maryland.gov was guided by input from Maryland residents and personnel from dozens of state agencies, with the goal to help Marylanders more efficiently engage with the State’s most frequently used resources, including job and career support, food and nutrition benefits, and unemployment insurance.

“The new Maryland.gov is more than a visual redesign,” said Maryland Department of Information Technology Secretary Katie Savage. “It’s a reflection of how we are rebuilding State websites to make them more accessible for the people we serve. You shouldn’t need a degree in state government to know everything Maryland can do for you—if you live or work here, Maryland.gov is the perfect place to learn more about everything our great state has to offer.”

The new Maryland.gov is built on a more modern and secure content management system. The system centers on accessibility, part of an ongoing effort led by the Maryland Digital Service to make state websites more readable, secure, and consistent for visitors. In addition to relaunching Maryland.gov, Maryland Digital Service is actively partnering with state agencies to improve their site architecture and content, ensuring that crucial webpages are modernized before they are moved to the new platform. The interagency partnership is ongoing, with dozens of new websites are on track to launch later this year.

Improvements made to the Maryland.gov website include:

- **Consistent user experience:** The overall user experience across state agency websites is often inconsistent, siloed,

and cumbersome, hindering residents’ and businesses’ ability to find information and complete tasks. The redesigned websites leverage user-centered design to ensure Maryland websites provide a seamless path towards frequently-used resources.

- **Built-in accessibility features:** According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, more than 1 million Marylanders have a disability, with many relying on assistive technology to access state benefits, resources, services, and opportunities online. Maryland’s new website technology has a stronger foundation of accessibility, ensuring that all Marylanders can take advantage of Maryland resources.

- **Plain language content:** Government websites can often contain jargon and technical language, which can be difficult for visitors to understand. To increase readability on frequently used webpages, the Maryland Digital Service is working in partnership with agencies to implement plain language content that is easy to understand and more clearly answers questions.

To simplify navigation, Maryland.gov now organizes resources into five clear categories: “Benefits;” “Services;” “Business and Work;” “Visit and Explore;” and “Your Government.” The “Benefits” section highlights the key benefits provided by the State of Maryland, grouped both by topic and by audience type, including families and children, and veterans.
